The main reason that makes it so lovely though is that members of our parish family rest there. There are many options and choices that people can make for themselves or their loved ones at the time of death – all

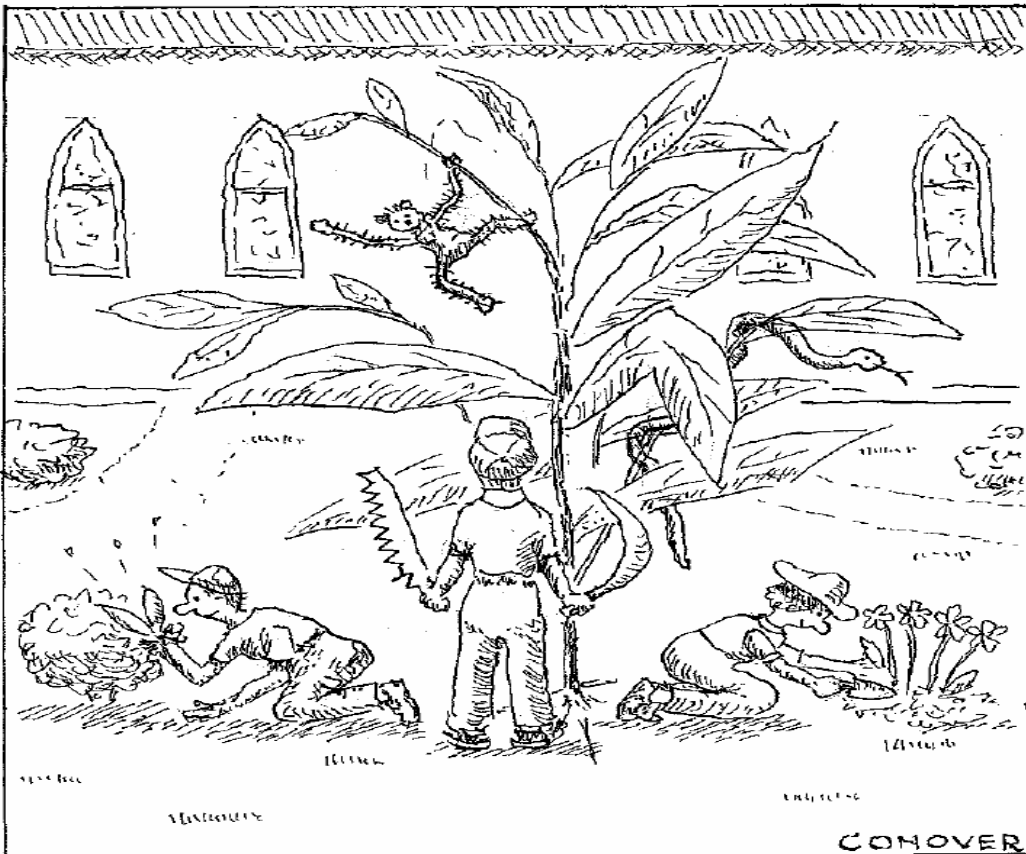

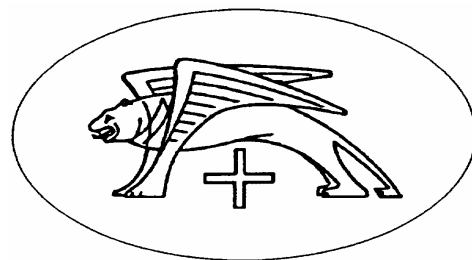
During the lazy, hazy days of summer take the time to sort your unwanted or unused items for donations to our great cause . Remember the items we cannot accept:

News from the Environmental Committee

As many of you know, an Environmental Committee was formed in mid April, following the presentation by Rev. Fletcher Harper of GreenFaith during Lent. The committee has met 3 times so far, and at its most recent meeting on June 23rd, identified a few priorities for its continuing attention. These include encouraging the recycling of waste paper, identifying and recommending to the Buildings Commission a few low cost, quick payback energy saving projects, and conducting an energy audit of our facility. As a first step for the audit, the committee is recommending that a do-it-yourself approach be used, and is looking for one or more parishioners with related expertise who would be interested in leading the effort. So if you are interested, let me know. And of course, membership on the Environmental Committee is open to all. Our next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, July 28th, at 7pm in the Heritage Room.

Finance Report as of May 31, 2009

Represented below is a summary of St. Mark's operating income statement.

May year-to-date operating income results are below budget by 9%. Pledge amounts for the month were over \$20,000 but year-to-date pledges are still below budget. We also appear to be below budget because the proceeds from the International Cuisine and Wine Tasting fundraising event held on May 30th were not reflected in May's results but in the May budget. Building use donations are slightly lower than last month and will remain so since the Science Camp will not be renting from us this summer due to low enrollment.

Year-to-date operating expenses are coming in under budget by 3% which is much better than last year at this time when we were over budget by 11%.

Net operating income is a negative \$6,000 but as mentioned above does not reflect the income from the Night of International Cuisine and Wine Tasting fundraising event. As a reminder the 2009 budget is based on a \$19,000 shortfall or deficit. To put these numbers in perspective, we expected to have year-to-date net operating income of \$2,272; we came in a negative \$6,031; add another \$8,000 for 5 months of the \$19,000 deficit and it adds up to an approximate \$16,000 deficit through May.

What do these numbers mean? Since we are being very conservative with our spending and have had only a few thousand dollars of unplanned expenses (rectory), the bottom line is we need to increase our income through show-stopping fundraising events and your continuous generous giving. Please contact Jim Lunny to volunteer to an August event, September Song and the Dinner Auction tentatively planned for November.

And while many of you are taking your well-deserved summer vacations, please don't forget to send in your pledge payments.

Summer Sunday School

Kids of all ages will be together for our summer Sunday School in the main, large classroom. We will be using the VeggieTales series for the weekly lessons. VeggieTales is an animated series created to convey Christian moral themes and Biblical values and lessons. Different themes are tackled by the animated veggies in each episode including self-esteem, giving and thankfulness. Are you looking for resources for parenting and raising a family in Episcopal tradition? Check out these books:

In the Midst of Chaos, by Bonnie J. Miller-McLemore

Theologian, mother, and writer Bonnie J. Miller-McLemore shows us how to integrate and strengthen the practice of faith in the everyday (and often mundane) experience of raising children. In the Midst of Chaos reveals what it takes to find the spiritual wisdom in the messy, familial ways of living. By rethinking parenting as an invitation to discover God in the middle of our busy and overstuffed lives, it relieves parents of the burden of being the all-knowing authority figures who impart spiritual knowledge to children. Finding spirituality in family activities such as reading bedtime stories, dividing household chores, and playing games can empower parents to notice what they are already doing as potentially valuable and to practice it more consciously as part of their own faith journey.

Anglican Family Prayer Book, by The Rev. Canon Anne Kitch

The Anglican Family Prayer Book is a resource for Episcopal families who want to pass on Anglican prayers and traditions to their children and teach faith in everyday settings. Compiled by The Rev. Canon Anne Kitch, well known for her children's books, Bless This Day and One Little Church Mouse. A parent as well as an educator, Anne Kitch introduces these Anglican prayers and practices with stories from her own life, as well as brief information about the history and use of the prayers. The Anglican Family Prayer Book helps parents and children pray together. Prayers for morning and evening, blessings, nighttime prayers, prayers for ordinary and special occasions, intercessory prayers, prayers of the Eucharist, and prayers for use during the special seasons of the Church year make this book one that families will use every day.

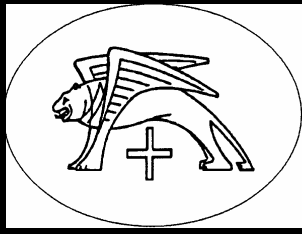
- What: An easy to moderate 1 1/2 -2 hour family hike followed by a picnic lunch at the park


